SCHOOL LOCATION

A Community Primary School for pupils aged 3 to 11 years. The present school buildings were opened in 1961 with extensions in 1980 and 2002. The school is sited in semi-rural surroundings south of the town of Carmarthen, close to the River Tywi. The school has available for its 300+ pupils large playing fields, together with a well stocked hall/gymnasium.



BAD WEATHER

Every effort will be made to ensure that the School is open during very bad weather, please see the School App/ Facebook for information regarding this. It's a good idea to listen for announcements on local radio when the weather is particularly bad or to look at Carmarthenshire County Council's website, following the 'Emergency School Closure' link.

ADMISSION AND RECEPTION

Children are entitled to receive up to 12.5 hours of education in Wales starting the term after their 3rd birthday. They will start full time school in the term following their 4th birthday – a separate application must be made for a full time school place. The parents of prospective pupils are required to submit an application form to Carmarthenshire County Council. The form may be filled on the county website.

During the half term before the child is due to start school, an arrangement is made for you to come to the School for you child to familiarise themselves with their new class 'Dosbarth Dewi ' and the staff who will be caring for them. You will be welcomed and receive a presentation in the school hall from the Head teacher, Mr Davies and Mrs Caron Thomas, Head of the Foundation Phase, where they will share information with you. The session will take about an hour.

- An information pack about the Foundation Learning and the School is prepared for each new parent, and a meeting will be arranged in order to present this.
- Parents are welcome to contact the School at any reasonable time to discuss arrangements for the admission of their child to School.
- Carmarthenshire County Council, through its Admissions Manager, instructs the Governing Body, and through this the Head, to make it clear to parents of any child admitted to the School from beyond its catchment area, that this may affect transfer to secondary education. It does not follow that entry into a primary school confers a right of entry into the secondary school/s of the catchment area; it is the home address of the child that dictates into which secondary school he or she may have entry. Parent feedback within the Appeals Process indicates that this is not always made clear from the start.




HOME / SCHOOL AGREEMENT



Our curriculum will provide learning experiences through the 6 Learning and Experience Areas of:




The children's education is presented through the medium of themes/concepts. These are carefully planned and organized so ensure a thorough coverage of all the what matters statements in each Area of Learning. The children's work will be kept in books, files and digitally. Work will also be displayed in the classroom and in various displays around the School.

LITERACY, NUMERACY AND DIGITAL COMPETANCY FRAMEWORK

Our curriculum will develop the mandatory cross-curricular skills of literacy, numeracy and digital competence. Our curriculum will enable learners to develop competence and capability in these skills and to extend and apply them across all Areas. Learners will be given opportunities across the curriculum to:

- develop listening, reading, speaking and writing skills
- be able to use numbers and solve problems in real-life situations
- be confident users of a range of technologies to help them function and communicate effectively and make sense of the world



We use a variety of Welsh and English reading programmes that are suitable for every child. A written record is kept of each child's reading progress. Reading in Key Stage Two is extended so as to use the skills acquired to expand knowledge and enhance enjoyment.

We urge you, as parents, to show interest in this reading and to encourage your children, in turn, to do the same. We ask you to contribute to the reading development of your child or children by sitting and listening to them read.

Literacy is a vital tool to ignite the imagination.



NUMERACY

Mathematical concepts and techniques are an essential part of everyday life and contribute significantly to our understanding of the world around us. We work tirelessly to develop a positive attitude towards mathematics as an interesting subject to be enjoyed.

Our aim is that children should be absolutely confident when they use numbers. We feel that practical work is important, but particular attention is given to basic skills. Learning times tables is very important, and they are taught at different levels. Children should memorize them, and help at home is asked for with regard to this. Children's mathematical understanding will be applied in other lessons across all areas of learning.




DIGITAL COMPETENCE

The latest Developments in the world of education have given a high status to Digital Competence and Technology. At Llangunnor School the emphasis is placed on developing Digital Competence through all Areas of Learning and Experience.

It is essential that the children are familiar with handling a computer and a variety of technological equipment. Digital Competence focuses on digital skills that can be used in a wide variety of subjects and situations.

Digital Competence is divided into 4 strands, which are divided into a number of elements.



HEALTH AND WELLBEING

The school provides an environment that is an incentive for pupils where they can work towards general maturity in developing physical skills and keeping healthy. Activities are offered that give pupils enjoyment and pleasure. We seek to promote confidence through physical activity and create awareness of the importance of fitness and health through exercising.

Pupils take part in movement and dance, gymnastics, indoor and outdoor physical education, football, netball, rugby, cricket, rounders and sports. The older children will have swimming lessons. The school has a number of teams which give the child the opportunity to compete individually and as a member of a team. They take part in a number of local competitions and it is ensured that all children have equal opportunities.

RELIGION, VALUES AND ETHICS

Religion, values and ethics (RVE) is a statutory requirement of the Curriculum for Wales and is mandatory for all learners from ages 3 to 16.

There is no parental right to request that a child is withdrawn from RVE in the Curriculum for Wales

As RVE is a locally determined subject, the agreed syllabus specifies what should be taught in RVE within the local authority and our curriculum will reflect this guidance.

COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

School assembly is an important part of the day and this is organized by different teachers in turn. The whole school will meet once a week to hold an assembly.

Each Progression Stage meets separately once a week for a class assembly. The children are encouraged to contribute during these services.

Parents have the right to keep their child out of the mass service and arrangements will be made for this that if there is demand.

CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

Our school will promote knowledge and understanding of Part 1 of the UNCRC, and of the UNCRPD, among those who provide teaching and learning.

RELATIONSHIP AND SEXUALITY EDUCATION

Our school curriculum embraces the guidance in the RSE Code. Our RSE provision will have a positive and empowering role in our learners' education and will play a vital role in supporting them to realise the four purposes as part of a whole-school approach. Helping learners to form and maintain a range of relationships, all based on mutual trust and respect, is the foundation of RSE. These relationships are critical to the development of emotional well-being, resilience and empathy.

HOMEWORK

We do set formal homework and place an emphasis on the following:



- We set reading books weekly, and we encourage you to read and discuss stories with your children at least 3 times a week. Remember reading with your child is vital. Literature is a special tool to spark the imagination and to learn new things.
- We will also set spelling words to learn.
- Numeracy fluency especially with times tables is vital. It's important that you practice the times tables with your child.
- Sometimes there will be exceptions and demanding tasks will be assigned to the school's oldest children.

EDUCATIONAL VISITS

Educational visits are organized according to the school's themes to stimulate the learners and to reinforce the class work. Year 6 pupils are offered opportunities to visit Urdd Camps.

OUTDOOR AREA

There are indoor and outdoor environments that are fun, exciting, stimulating and safe promoting children's development and their natural curiosity to explore and learn through real life direct experiences. With the new Curriculum, increasing emphasis is placed on using the outside environment as a learning resource in order to encourage this.

Outdoor daily activities are held in the Foundation Learning Phase. On Tuesdays activities are held for Gwenllian class. On Wednesday activities are held for Myrddin class. On Thursdays activities are held for Arthur class. On Friday activities are held for Rhiannon, Sandde, Pwyll, Glyndwr, Buddug and Llywelyn classes.



LEARNING, PROGRESSION AND ASSESSMENT

Our curriculum will support learning through designing learning opportunities that draw upon the pedagogical principles.

Our curriculum, supported by effective teaching and learning enables learners to make meaningful progress. Over time our learners will develop and improve their skills and knowledge. Our curriculum focuses on understanding what it means to make progress in a given Area or discipline and how learners should deepen and broaden their knowledge and understanding, skills and capacities, and attributes and dispositions and is informed by the Progression Code. This in turn supports our approach to assessment, the purpose of which is to inform planning for future learning. Assessment will be embedded as an intrinsic part of learning and teaching. All learners will be assessed on entry to the school .

Annual written reports are presented to parents about their child's progress. Children are assessed internally as part of the School's assessment policy. Each class teacher assesses the children's work daily in a variety of ways. The teachers constantly assess learners' progress and if it is noticed that the pupil is not making satisfactory progress then the parents are contacted.

Parents' evenings are held in the Autumn and Summer term..

REVIEW AND REFINEMENT

Our school curriculum will be kept under review in order to respond to the outputs of professional inquiry, the changing needs of learners and social contexts and needs. The reviews will take into account the views of stake-holders and will be signed off by the Governing Body. We will publish a summary of our curriculum and revise the summary if changes to the curriculum are made during the review process.

SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2024-25

It is a statutory requirement for us to set annual TARGETS that we should try to reach towards:

Developing whole-school methods that encourage the independence of our learners ensuring that the level of challenge is suitable, focusing on introducing and embedding an inquiry method.

Continue to develop the role of our Area leaders in order to strengthen our planning strategies, monitoring, evaluation and quality improvement processes.

Develop, implement, evaluate and refine our Expressive Arts curriculum in order to ensure consistency of provision to meet the needs of the Area of Learning.

Strengthen the role and input of the Governors into the processes of monitoring and self-evaluation of the Curriculum and the operational processes of the school.

Additional Learning Needs (ALN)

Our aim as a school is to provide opportunities for all children to develop to their full potential whatever their ability and needs

It is ensured that children with Additional Learning Needs (ALN) have all fair play within the school and it is considered important to identify educational difficulties early on. In order to identify the specific needs of each child the school has a method of detailed assessment and as a result a relevant work program is organised for them. All teachers have a responsibility to create differentiated work and adjust work plans when necessary.

At the beginning of each year class teachers and the ALNCO (The Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator) work closely together. Each individual is discussed in class, it is considered which learners will be placed on the Learning Needs List and targets are outlined. These will be monitored and reviewed regularly. If a child is identified with ALN then they are given an Individual Development Plan. Parents will be informed of this process. These children will receive additional support from the teaching and non-teaching staff. Local Authority support services are consulted and other agencies to get advice, guidance and support when needed.

Annually we create a One Page Profile as a school and individually. The purpose of a One Page Profile is to know exactly which way is best to support your child and what provision is needed. Children who have an IDP will have an yearly review in order to create a successful action plan which helps us receive relevant support from experts, external agencies involved with the learner's needs.

The ALNCo liaises with class teachers and parents and assists in planning appropriate intervention (Individual Development Plans).

The school's ALNCo is Mrs Caron Thomas (Assistant Headteacher)

ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE ADMISSION OF PUPILS WITH A DISABILITY

The school has an access plan for the disabled in order to ensure equal opportunities and the Plan Strategic Equality complies with the Equality Act 2010

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES

The School has a clear policy to ensure equal opportunities for all members of the school community. The School Equality Plan (SEP) and the action plan is available at the School Office.

Our aim is to ensure educational equality and the same opportunities for all pupils, staff, parents and carers who receive services from the School, whatever their disability, race, sex, age, sexual orientation, religion, belief, transgender, pregnancy and maternity, marriage or civil partnership. We try to develop a culture of inclusion and diversity that enables everyone associated with the School to feel proud of their identity, participating fully in the life of the School. We believe that diversity is a strength that should be respected and celebrated by everyone who teach here, who are taught and who visit the School.



LANGUAGE POLICY

Llangunnor Primary School provides education through the medium of Welsh and English across two streams.

Our provision within the school is a solely Welsh medium curriculum in Nursery, Reception, Years 1 and Year 2, with dual stream provision provided from Year 3 onwards. In our Welsh medium classes at Llangunnor School, Welsh is the main medium of life and work. English is introduced as pupils transfer to Year 3 so that pupils have the opportunity to develop an equal competence in both languages. In our English medium classes, the Welsh language is often used as a mean of communication. This builds upon the strong foundation set in the early years to ensure continued development of the learning of the Welsh language and to ensure an equal opportunity for both English and Welsh in the life and work of the school. It is the aim of the school to develop linguistic competence in both languages by the age of 11.

We are, of course, sensitive and aware that a child may feel anxious about learning a new language that is strange to them. We make sure that no child should feel uncomfortable at any time – the paramount concern is the child, and his or her educational interest. The introduction of a second language to a child is carried out sensibly and flexibly in order to ensure success. If further explanation with regard to this is desired, guidance will be given by the staff of the School.



PROCEDURE FOR COMPLAINTS RELATING TO THE CURRICULUM

If any parent has a complaint relating to the curriculum or any matter relating school life the first point of contact is the School. The School operates an open-door policy, where parents can discuss any concern informally with a member of staff or the Head. We are confident that most problems can be solved by speaking with the class teachers. If the matter cannot be solved, then help is available from the Head. If the problem cannot be solved within the School, then the Head will follow the procedure set out in the School's Complaints Policy.

A copy of the Policy is available at the School Office and on the School's website.

PASTORAL CARE

The Head is responsible for the pastoral organisation of the School. The class teachers are responsible for the educational progress and pastoral care of children within their classroom and during playtime. Members of staff take care of children during lunchtime.

Children may, occasionally, be ill at school or an accident may occur. Minor events will be dealt with by the staff, but parents will be contacted if there is any doubt. In more serious circumstances, and if parents cannot be contacted, the Head will take responsibility for the appropriate action to take.

SCHOOL RULES AND DISCIPLINE

Every child is expected to behave in an acceptable manner as a member of society within the School. Children are urged to respect the rights and property of other people. We believe that the 'learner's voice' is important.

BULLYING

The School has a dedicated policy on bullying stating that every child has the right to be educated in a safe and pleasant environment. Our aim as a school is to ensure that no bullying at all will be tolerated. We work towards eliminating all forms of bullying by obtaining total co-operation from pupils, staff, parents and governors.

If you suspect that your child is being bullied you should contact the School immediately – you should not raise the matter with individual pupils or parents. A copy of the Bullying Policy is available at the School Office or on the School's website.

SCHOOL DINNER

Primary age children have free school dinners. If you believe that you're eligible to claim free school meals (National Campaign), this can be done via the Carmarthenshire Council website .

The children are encouraged to eat their food and we expect good behaviour at the table.

PACKED LUNCH

Since we are a healthy school we are required to ensure that every child eats healthy food and is given opportunities to develop physically. Thus, for the benefit of your children, could you please include a variety of healthy foods in your children's lunch packs. The packs should not contain more than one sweet item (not chocolate bars). We welcome water and/or water flavoured with fresh fruit.



SCHOOL UNIFORM

Keeping to school uniform rules is very important. This is not only practical, it also creates a sense of identity with the school and every child looks alike, thus supporting equality.

Jewellery Policy

JEWELLERY – Jewellery such as rings, bracelets, chains or necklaces are not allowed. It is strongly advised that children do not wear earrings to school but when this is not possible one small gold /silver stud earring is allowed in each ear. We suggest that ear piercing is done only at the start of the summer holidays. Earrings must be removed for sports and PE lessons - this is difficult to do if the ears are newly pierced. Parents are asked to sign a disclaimer if their child is not able to remove their earrings for school. A pupil is not allowed to wear studs in any other piercings. Members of staff have the right to ask a pupil to remove these if they break the rule.

AFTERSCHOOL CLUBS


CLWB CYNNWR (Registered with the CIW)
